

Reading for Empathy ~ the research

There is much evidence to show that meeting characters and different situations in literature builds our understanding of others – we notice their feelings, we step into the shoes of others and imagine how they might feel; and we act accordingly to help others or to affect social change.

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
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Reading for Empathy contd...

- Empathy Emotions Map ~ understand and share feelings ~ there are some incredible examples created by authors and illustrators for inspiration
- Making an Empathy Resolution.



Rainbow shelves for pride



I've done the work for you too and have created some resources to accompany the book that can be accessed via the owlet press website.




